PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

It is always a surprise when Labour Day weekend comes along and the

new season is upon us with the start-up of many new and renewed activities.

My daughter and I were chatting on the phone about buying the school clothes and shoes for those youth growth spurts. Education is something our club promotes as well as pursuing knowledge, so I always welcome a chat about the new books needed, how the science and history fairs work today and even how a school related book club has an electronic checklist to assist in tailoring the reading list. Parents across the country are puzzling out their new schedules for the back-to-school routines and how to handle

any transportation challenges in the congested lower mainland. Teachers, administrators and others in the schools and colleges are back from vacation and are looking forward to their time with children, youth and adults— all our precious future in Canada.

I shared with my daughter that I am incoming president and she teased that I was either caught unaware and said yes or no one else wanted to do it when the nomination process was underway - but, thankfully, our club is an amazing one with many experienced and gifted members. This is my third club. My membership over the years has been tied to personal formation as well as fellowship and advocacy.

It seems a lifetime ago in Winnipeg when three young moms were taking time out from the workforce due to the lack of day care spaces. We swapped time off days with each other to care for each other's children – so each of us could have some adult time as well as maintain professional ties and do some continuing education. Then a CFUW member invited us to a meeting over at the historic Ralph Connor House. Next thing we knew, we had joined some interest groups including Issues and Actions. It was months later before we figured out who everyone was and that the working together had been with committed purpose since 1909.

A work-related move took our family to Regina, and a prairie trick for the long winter is to get involved in the community. So I joined the Regina CFUW, which met in members' homes. The club supported my running for school trustee, and as a club began the Headstart Program that assisted inner city children. Member Jean Steer was elected the National CFUW President (the days when clubs took turns instead of an office in Ottawa) and the Reginal Club suddenly did double duty. My add-on was to be the editor of the national bilingual newsletter, while another member became the Treasurer for the International Federation of University Women (IFUW prior to becoming GWI) and travelled to Geneva.

Some suggest that we can never really go home again. I was born in White Rock and have returned to White Rock/Surrey. It is both familiar and unfamiliar due to the endless changes and certainly feels like "the gift" for growing older and yet finding new stages of life. It is a community-at-large that daily exhibits that so many are not standing still and wasting 25-30 per cent of their lives. Everywhere we look and go in White Rock/Surrey (and Langley) there are so many possibilities, the ongoing creation of new activities and networks of interesting people. Our club certainly is a part of the whole.

Highlights from the CFUW Annual Convention, June 2016

What a privilege it was for me to represent our club at the CFUW Annual General Meeting held this year at Brock University in St. Catharines, Ontario from June 23-25.

The theme of this year's meeting, 'Growing Toward a New Tomorrow', resonated through the many meetings, workshops and events throughout the 'jam-packed' agenda. The annual conference provided a great opportunity to discuss and vote on important issues, learn more about CFUW nationally and regionally, network with fellow members from across Canada and learn through the excellent plenary sessions and workshops.

Social, Networking and Learning Opportunities

Multiple tours were offered as pre and post conference activities offering opportunities to meet old and make new friends, explore the Niagara region from scenery to shopping as well as enjoy wine tasting,

theatre and golf. Truly, something for everyone!

On Thursday evening a welcome reception was held with greetings from local leaders and a speech from Doris Mae Oulton, our outgoing National President. The reception featured the music of drumming group Strong Water, Zhong Naibi Kwe.

Following the reception a delightful performance of the play 'Let Them Howl' written by Sharon Bajer.





You may be familiar with the famous Nellie McClung quote 'Never explain, never retract, never apologize, just get the thing done and let them howl'. In the play, the actors (comprised of CFUW members from across Canada) enjoyed performing this line as they reenacted the famous 'mock parliament that featured Nellie McClung and her peers in the Political Equality League.

CFUW members rehearsed remotely, working across Canada to prepare for the show. Their final rehearsal (and first face to face practice) provided an opportunity for coaching at the venue the day before the

performance with the guidance of a professional director.

I was so surprised at the end of the show when the organizers thanked and named the director as Dia Frid. Dia had cast and directed my daughter, Christie, 16 years ago in her first professional musical performance when Dia chose Christie to play Dorothy in the Wizard of Oz. I was thrilled to have an opportunity to reminisce with Dia following the show.

Speakers

Dr. Bonnie Rose, former Executive Vice President at Niagara University in Lewiston, New York, gave the opening plenary session on Friday morning. Dr. Rose provided many insightful comments from her personal experience with the challenges and current realities for universities and colleges. Her provocative comments, such as 'eternal life is not a given' for the current mode of operating in higher education, resonated with many of us in the audience. Dr. Rose had high praise for the many CFUW bursaries that are offered and CFUW's efforts that continue to support women in education and leadership positions.

Saturday began with an 8:30 am opening plenary given by **Brenda Shanahan** entitled 'From Club to Commons'. Brenda Shanahan, former CFUW VP for Quebec and presently Member of Parliament for Châteauguay-Lacolle, spoke to members about the power of civic engagement, advocacy, and her journey to her present position in Parliament.

Workshops

Numerous workshops were offered during the conference and I attended two: CFUW 'Club Governance: Sharing Ideas for the Future' presented by Karen Dunnett and Madeline Kalbach and 'CFUW in the World' presented by Cheryl Hayles. The workshop on club governance provided an opportunity for attendees to share ideas on current and alternative models of club structure. Clubs vary greatly in size and structure and it was very interesting to hear how other clubs manage meeting schedules and executive roles. Our club has

already implemented some changes over the last few years, such as shared roles on the executive so that members can 'job share' the work involved in the positions. During the coming months we may be able to consider more ways to grow and change in dynamic ways to engage and serve our membership.

Business Meeting

This business meeting at this year's AGM was extremely interesting and incredibly dense in the amount of important issues that needed to be discussed and voted upon. Presiding Parliamentarian, Eleanor Stewart, kept the sessions on track and ensured that Robert's Rules for parliamentary procedure were upheld; the introduction of a 'clicker' system for voting was very efficient and definitely sped up the process of recording votes. The report from Robin Jackson, Executive director of CFUW national office provided an impressive account of the many ways the national office has been active this year in membership, scholarships/bursaries, building CFUW profile, advocacy and sustainability. Resolutions

Five resolutions were put forth for consideration. Our club voted to support all five resolutions and I'm happy to say that all were passed at the AGM.

- 1. Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls: Ending the Marginalization of Indigenous Women in Canadian Society
- 2. Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD): Diagnosis, Intervention and Support Plan for Children, Adults and Families Affected by FASD

- 3. To Strengthen the Pest Management Regulatory Agency of Health Canada in its Mandate to Approve, Register and Monitor Pesticides, in a timely manner, as well as to protect the health of Canadians and the environment.
- 4. Electoral Reform: Changing the First Past the Post Electoral System to Proportional Representation in Canada.
- 5. Sustainable Development Goals, also known as Global Goals.

Resolutions for GWI

Three resolutions were put forward for CFUW delegates to bring to the 2016 GWI Triennial Conference that will take place in Capetown in August. These are:

- 1. Full Accessibility and Barrier Free Environments for Persons with Disabilities
- 2. Reducing Climate Change Through the Use of Carbon Taxes
- 3. Bullying and Cyberbullying

Changes in Articles and Bylaws

- 1. An Amendment to the CFUW Articles and Bylaws was put forward by the CFUW Board of Directors, and passed by the clubs. The Articles and Bylaws now reads as follows:
- **F. Committees:** The following committees shall be designated Standing Committees of the Board: Advocacy, Articles and Bylaws, Education, Fellowships, Finance, Governance, International Relations, Nominations, and Resolutions.
- 2. The amendment put forward by CFUW St. Thomas, "Withdrawal of CFUW from Graduate Women International (GWI)" failed. Over many months leading up to the AGM, clubs across the country engaged in thoughtful debate over this amendment. At the business meeting of the AGM discussion continued with arguments put forth in favour and against the amendment; an extension of 30 minutes allowed additional time to discuss the issue. I voted in accordance with our members' decision to support the motion. The majority of the votes at the AGM were in support of accepting the St. Thomas' club amendment (55% voting to withdraw from GWI, and 45% voting to remain), however, to pass an amendment a 2/3 majority of votes must be in support of the change. Therefore, the amendment failed.

Next steps re GWI

CFUW delegates will attend the GWI Triennial Conference in Cape Town, South Africa in August. The following motion was put forth and voted upon at the AGM regarding CFUW delegates to the GWI Triennial. This motion was presented by the Board of Directors and passed with 81% of delegates voting in support.

- 1. The voting delegation will support the candidates nominated by CFUW.
- 2. The voting delegates will support CFUW positions.
- 3. The delegation will reject the resolution for the fee increase, as written
- 4. That the CFUW President and VP International Relations be given authority to caucus with delegates at the 32nd GWI Triennial Conference in Cape Town South Africa in August 2016.
- 5. That the CFUW Delegation, operating with the caucus direction, be given discretionary leeway to vote collectively in the best interests of CFUW at the 32nd GWI Triennial Conference in Cape Town, South Africa, in August 2016.

Federation Banquet



AMA house is a transition home for women aged 55+ who need to leave their place of residence. Women may stay at AMA house from 30 to 180 days and are helped creating a better life.

AMA house accepts approximately 35 women per year. Last year, there were 696 ladies AMA house was unable to help!

Our club makes the transition period a happier time in these women's lives. We donate articles of apparel that the women wear when seeking employment. At Christmas and Easter, we supply baking goods, so that the ladies are able to bake for themselves and to bake a gift for their loved ones and friends A Christmas dinner is created by the women of AMA house, funded by the generous donations of our club members. Throughout the year, we supply clothing that is fresh and of good quality for daily wear.

Our club works with the staff and the occupants of AMA house to help create successes, happiness, and peace of mind. We are always looking for new ways to help these women.

Active in various behaviour analytic organizations, she currently serves as treasurer on the board of the British Columbia Association for Behaviour Analysis.

Paige is a local girl who graduated from UBC with a Bachelor of Science in Biology in 2012 and currently works for the Department of Fisheries and Oceans Canada in the Molecular Genetics Department. This fall, she is attending King's College, London, UK, and is enrolled in a MA degree program in Bioethics and Society. After completing her masters, she intends to pursue a career in policy development implementation in the medical field.




