At 1:35 pm, the AGM was called to order, and Carolyn gave the Surrey/White Rock Bursary Foundation Report, which also had been provided to members, as had the overall AGM Agenda and the White Rock/Surrey Annual Report.

As President, I thanked Veronika for her year of work for the newsletters and the website. Co-vice chair Lorna spoke about the National Notable Women submissions and presented a bouquet of flowers to all who had been suggested for possible submission: Elizabeth, Helen and Pat (Monica and Diane were absent).

Our treasurer sent regrets and past president Trudy presented her report (\$23,215.08 cash position as of April 30, 2017) and I received the cashbox, cash and cheques for the day, plus the luncheon invoice and issued the \$1,382.52 cheque to the golf club.

The board slate for 2017-18 was approved although there still were vacancies for the other co-vice president and communications. Sandra and Sherrill will assist with the preliminary planning for our club's 60th anniversary.

Although a few had to leave, members present participated next with their ideas for the three motions that were specific to the fundraising proposal "Art as Fashion, Fashion as Art" which had gone to the board from the Art Appreciation interest group. (Note: any expenditure over \$500 cannot be passed by the board but has to be approved by the members). Trudy as past president handled the portion for the motions as my jetlag had appeared, and the motions were moved by Sandra who also spoke to them. The key motion for the project to move forward was defeated. However, there was a consensus that the Art Appreciation group's work was appreciated and, hopefully, they can regroup and rethink the project.

Kudos to Lynn and Robin for their leadership for AGM arrangements, plus Penny, Karen, Sherrill, Helen, Kathy S., Gloria and her team. We certainly were able to celebrate Canada's 150th anniversary.

THE NATIONAL CFUW AGM

The National Annual General Meeting (AGM) was held June 22-25 at the Sheraton in Richmond, and it was the first I have attended. However, almost 50% of all club presidents there were “first timers.” I had the advantage of sharing a room with Diane Salter Menzo (both of us were the club delegates, and I was the voting delegate) and we were joined by Sylvia Riddell from June 22-24, plus Monica von Kursell, Elizabeth Bordeaux and Lois Hunter for the June 24 business day. Karen Peplow, a dual member in our club, also is President of the New Westminster Club, was a voting delegate.

Prior to the opening reception, Helen Sami, Vice President of Finance/Board of Directors, and I had a serious discussion with a glass of wine by the pool. Three national budgets were prepared (options D,E, F) and were going to be presented for consideration/discussion, and one would have to be chosen. Also, before Diane and I were fully unpacked, Diane was asked to fill in as Acting Chair of the Articles and Bylaws Standing Committee. To our surprise, there was a National Board “script” including timing for the business meeting.

The opening reception included acknowledgement of indigenous peoples, the introduction of the local Richmond committee, plus the national staff and regional directors across Canada. The Chinese entertainment was superb. Diane spent the evening preparing for her acting role and I joined other club delegates at the Empire Seafood Restaurant. Later, about midnight, I reviewed the National Board “script.”

Friday, during the day, the three of us attended different breakfasts and then learning and development workshops. My workshops were Developing Leadership Skills, Social Media and Membership, and Marketing Ourselves for Growth – plus the current and incoming club president’s luncheon. All four of us heard the keynote speaker, Daphne Bramham, on the topic “The Cure for Populism, Propaganda, False Prophets and Poverty.” She is a Vancouver based journalist and author. Her book, “The Secret Lives of Saints, Child Brides and Lost Boys in Canada’s Polygamous Mormon Sect”, was nominated for three national, non-fiction book awards.

At the Federation Banquet, we were assigned to tables. I had the pleasure to sit with Jean Garnett, Chair of the Local Arrangements Committee (LAC), and Barbara DuMoulin, Regional Director BC Vancouver Island. Members of our club may recall that Jean came to one of our monthly meetings to talk about home hospitality and Barbara received our notable women submissions. Our entertainment was the Rainbow Dancers (Chinese line dancing) and the Richmond Youth Choir.

June 24, on the business meeting day, I did not attend the charitable trust breakfast, but opted for general breakfast networking and a fresh air walk and short look at the Charitable Trust Boutique. Grace Hollett, National President, presided and Elizabeth Hayes was Parliamentarian. All of us sat at one table close to the platform and were joined by the co-president of the West Vancouver Club and another member who also was on the National Finance Committee. Everything was running smoothly, until a fire alarm went off and the business meeting had to go on hold status. By 10:45, timing was derailed again when everything

was well underway, as the factions started lining up at the two microphones. Just about anything would serve as a tactical delay! Lunch, thankfully, did take place and the BC Region as other regions did meet together. I thanked Jean and her committee for all their work and Jean in turn thanked our club for our home hospitality.

The finance report resulted in more lineups at the mike, including yours truly trying to assist the VP with points for clarification. The delegates did choose a budget.

There was a vote regarding GWI – and once again there was not a two thirds majority – and the motion was defeated, so we all are still members of GWI and pay dues to it. Diane and I wrote a floor motion and gave it to the platform party for future consideration.

Then time ran out at 5:00 pm. All other business fell to the floor.

And our club later held our home hospitality.

REPORT ON BC COUNCIL AGM IN KELOWNA MAY 26 -28, 2017

It was my pleasure to represent our club as the voting delegate at the BC Council AGM 2017 in Kelowna. The conference was held at the Coast Capri Hotel and the theme was “Ahead of Our Times – The Future is Now”, and reflects the progressive activities of all CFUW BC clubs.

The conference was preceded by several tours to highlight the surrounding area, and I chose to visit the unique organic Summerhill Winery. At the opening reception, we enjoyed hospitality and were entertained by an exceptional jazz ensemble from a local school. A variety of workshops was offered, and I attended one on “Building Sustainable Landscapes: Lessons from the Okanagan” – emphasizing that we must consider the environmental impact of our ecological footprint when planning, and how best to ensure our landscape remains sustainable and resilient and includes corridors of access for all species. Another workshop addressed “Food Sustainability” and some considerations we can employ such as reducing food waste, supporting those experiencing food insecurity, and ensuring sufficient, nutritious, safe and culturally appropriate food for all in our community.

Another speaker, Dr. Mary Jung, one of the top women researchers in the health sciences, discussed how to get us to integrate more exercise in our daily routines to prevent many health risks. Of

particular note was the positive effect of 30 minutes per day or 2.5 hrs/week in decreasing the incidence of Type 2 diabetes. Less than 5% of Canadians meet Canada’s exercise guidelines of 150 min/week.

One of the most interesting and informative parts of the conference was the update from each club with representatives from 21 of the 23 BC clubs in attendance. It is amazing to hear of the special projects, advocacy work, and the many ways we support women and children in our communities. There were no provincial resolutions this year. Proposed changes to the BC Constitution and By-Laws were discussed and voted on during the business session. The major change is that the four standing committee chairs will now be appointed by the board, not elected. The National CFUW goal of raising an additional \$100,000 for scholarships and awards to celebrate the 100th Anniversary in 2019 has been reached, largely due to contributions from the BC Council group. At the National AGM in 2019, all clubs will be publicly recognized for their additional local awards and/or donations to the CFUW Trust for additional fellowships.

The focus of the last day of the conference was an interactive session with leaders Audrey Hobbs Johnson and Rachel Malek on BC Youth Aging Out of Foster Care. This will be the main advocacy project for the coming year, and it is hoped that all BC clubs will form study circle groups to educate themselves as to what is happening in their own communities and how best to support this group of marginalized youth. The Fall 2017 BC Council Bulletin, *For The Record*, will have further reports on this project and conference highlights.

This was a most enjoyable conference and I look forward to sharing more of my experiences with our club members. The 2018 BC Council AGM will be hosted by North Vancouver on April 20 – 22, 2018.

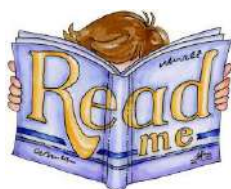

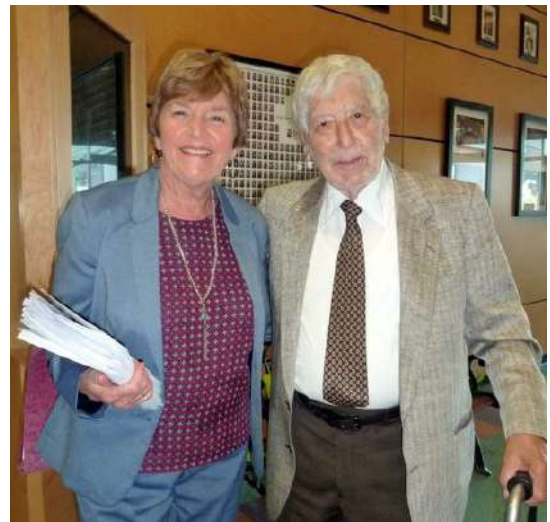
off by raconteur Maestro George Zukerman, recalling fascinating stories and memoirs from his long and illustrious career in music around the world.
