REPORT ON THE CFUW 100TH ANNIVERSARY CONFERENCE IN WINNIPEG AUGUST 2019 (Lois Hunter)

It was indeed a pleasure to be our club's voting delegate at the 100^{th} Anniversary conference in Winnipeg, August 15 - 17, 2019. The conference was proudly hosted by the University Women's clubs of Winnipeg & Portage la Prairie and held at the historic Fort Garry Hotel, the location of our founding meeting in 1919. The theme of the conference was *"100 years of CFUW – The Power of Women Working Together"* and was attended by over 300 members from clubs across Canada. Winnipeg, located near the geographical center of Canada & North America, offered much to enjoy as there were many tours of historical sites and local attractions in the surrounding area and opportunities to partake of the unique foods and culture. The Canadian Museum for Human Rights tour was one of the highlights for me, and it was a most inspiring and impressive facility to experience. A tour to Gimli through the prairie landscape and a glimpse of the famous white pelicans on the red River was another treat.

The conference began with a reception on the Thursday evening with a welcome by Grace Hollett, our CFUW national president, and local dignitaries including Maryam Monsef, Minister for Women & Gender Equality. This was followed by an introduction of the CFUW board and regional directors who did a roll call of their clubs and presentation of awards. We were entertained by a youth jazz band.

Business sessions were held on the following two days of the conference and any voting was done using

an electronic clicker system that greatly speeded up the counting of votes. The first day began with a breakfast featuring keynote speaker Elizabeth May, leader of the Green Party and a member of CFUW Saanich Peninsula, who reminded us of the very important difference between evidence-based decision making and decision-based evidence making and the importance of women in parliament.

The business meeting was called to order and the invocation was given by Sue Foley-Currie of our club. The morning session included the unveiling of a plaque from Parks Canada honoring CFUW as a significant national historic organization. Senator Marilou McPhedran spoke of the importance of women's organizations in social society leadership and the history of the struggle of indigenous women. Dr. Dianne Dodd, a historian, who has compiled a history book of the first

100 years of CFUW, gave a preview of her book which can be preordered from CFUW National office for \$30.

The afternoon session began with a panel on "Women and Leadership – Future Directions". The essence

of the panel's discussion dealt with the challenges that women face in taking on leadership roles and how some of the media undermine women's qualities, but this will lessen as more women get involved and help to change the laws that were made by men for men.

A "visioning" workshop session was held which divided us into groups to brainstorm and share ideas on how we see the CFUW of the future and how we can grow our organization – results will be sent out in a CFUW news release. The first business session approved a motion that Dr. Donna Strickland, a Canadian who was the 2018 recipient of the Nobel Prize in Physics, be made an honorary CFUW member.

The 100th Anniversary Notable Women Banquet concluded the day's events. This was an evening to remember as the 100 women who had been selected by their clubs were honored and their bios read out as they were presented. Our club had two Honorable Women named, Helen Christiansen and Patricia Hyde. They were also feted with an earlier reception at Government House.

The last day of the conference began with the Charitable Trust breakfast which was held at the historic Manitoba club, next door to the Fort Garry Hotel. The Charitable Trust which supports post-graduate education for women graduates, had a 100th Anniversary Scholarship Project whereby local, regional and national levels of CFUW were encouraged to provide an additional \$100,000 in scholarships and awards in 2019. Seventy-eight (78) clubs across Canada (including ours) took part in this initiative and the goal was exceeded to the total amount of \$215,269. The keynote speaker at the breakfast was Natalie Rogers Foidart, a previous CFUW Fellowship winner who is now Project Manager of Exhibitions at the Canadian Museum for Human Rights.

The Saturday business session completed the voting on the remaining financial motions. There were three motions and only the motion to increase our CFUW National dues by \$6 per capita was approved. This was the one our club supported, and the Winnipeg motion and the motion to increase fees by \$10 on May 1st, 2020 to support GWI were both defeated.

A report on the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with GWI, signed on July 17/19 was presented on behalf of the board and ratified. Although it was not the outcome that some had hoped for, it will allow both organizations to work together for effective collaboration and move forward to find ways that will still work to our mutual benefit. Much work remains to be done to activate some of the MOU provisions but this sets the scene for our members to provide new solutions.

Voluntary contributions from CFUW members and fundraising from the draw for the 2 antique IFUW pins helped to resolve our financial debt to GWI. It was a nice surprise to have Doreen Hoath, a long-time member of our club, win one of the pins.

The lunch time on the last day of the conference was reserved for the regional lunches. There are 5 regions of members in Canada – Atlantic, Quebec, Ontario, the Prairies, and British Columbia. Our BC regional lunch was chaired by Barbara Du Moulin, CFUW Salt Spring Island, who is the president of BC Council and national VP for BC region. There was a large contingent of BC members (69) at the conference and this was an opportunity to network, renew former acquaintances, meet new friends and be updated on upcoming events.

I would like to thank our club for the opportunity to be a delegate at this momentous 100th Anniversary AGM in Winnipeg. I look forward to sharing much more than what could be covered in this report.

CFUW White Rock/Surrey Received Two Notable Women Awards in Winnipeg

Our club had nominated Patricia Hyde and Helen Christiansen for the 100th Anniversary Notable Woman Award. The 100 nominees were chosen from clubs across Canada for the work they had done to further the goals of CFUW. Patricia Hyde was nominated for her many years of service. She worked to build "GARDENS IN BLOOM" into a very profitable bursary fundraiser. She not only chaired this large committee that involved most members in some capacity, but also sold passports to guests from other municipalities from around the lower mainland. It was an exceptional easy way to advertise for CFUW.

Patricia also introduced the One to One literacy program in local schools. This program continues today in four public schools. It involves our club members as student assistants, and also engages community members as helpers. In the community, Patricia served on the Surrey Public Library Board for eight year. During this time Surrey opened four new libraries.

Unfortunately, Patricia was not able to attend the AGM in Winnipeg but she was included in the commemorative booklet and will receive her certificate, book of notable women, and her gold pin to honour her years of service.

Helen Christiansen was nominated for 57 years of CFUW membership in four clubs across Canada. In each, she served on the executive as bursary fundraiser, program chair, vice president and president in three provinces. Growth often comes with shared ideas. The very successful secondhand book sales held annually in Montreal South Shore Club became a new and very successful venture for a decade in South Delta, usually earning over \$3,000 annually. Helen's aim was always to raise CFUW's profile in the community holding public events. She worked with Patricia Hyde on Gardens in Bloom, chaired the 40th Anniversary Committee, and the Celebration of the 40th Gala. For the 50th Anniversary chaired by Elizabeth Bordeaux, Helen organized the profitable Electra Choir Concert at Earl Marriott School.

100th Anniversary Notable Women Banquet Celebration was held in the Fort Garry Hotel Grand Ballroom. On Friday night of the AGM, after a long day of meetings, a formal dinner was held. It seemed even longer for the 70 notable women who had spent time lining up outside the Grand Ballroom to be arranged in alphabetical order. Meanwhile, the delegates and dignitaries were waiting patiently in the ballroom for us to arrive. Once ready, we were piped in by a female piper who paraded us to our tables.



After dinner, recipients were called to the stage to be introduced by the coemcees Grace Hollett, President, and Doris Mae Oulton, past president and

chair of the Notable Woman Committee. They alternated giving individual introductions and citing our CFUW contributions over the years. Even though it was a lengthy ceremony, it was interesting to hear the varied accomplishments of women from clubs across Canada. Before we left the stage, each was presented with her certificate, and the centenary gold pins engraved with the CFUW logo and the years 1919-2019.

Needless to say, I was pleased to see many members I knew from across Canada and happy to see their work recognized. The 100th birthday party was a spectacular success! *(Helen Christiansen)*
