Through many chapters in her life, Laura ended up being the owner of The Modern General Store – Apothecary, Bakery, Café, Floral, Grocery. By her design it is a warm, welcoming place in a walkable location where all are welcome – dogs, babies, teenagers, seniors and empty nesters. It's a community gathering place



where all are invited to feel comfortable and have someone to talk to, just like around your kitchen table. The aroma of baking bread and other delicious delights, being prepared right there in the kitchen, scent the air. Tables are moveable and can be arranged to accommodate any type of group, whether learning to knit, speak a foreign language, meeting friends or having an intimate conversation with just one. If you have a brainwave, a need or a long simmering idea, speak to Laura.

The Modern General Store also offers a place to learn about bussing tables, making coffee, serving customers and all the necessities of running a successful business whether you are a teenager, eager to learn in a place where the atmosphere is open and respectful of food, the environment and each other, or someone looking for a change and a chance to grow. In many ways, The Modern General Store is like the general store we remember from when we were growing up. The products are many and varied, generally locally sourced, often from an artisan working at home, and rotate with the seasons and opportunities.

According to Laura, people love what is happening in the store as it reminds them of communities, like in European plazas, where people connect and share ideas and values. How all this happens, Laura says, is not found in a book. Staffing, training, planning and the bottom line are important and may be discussed in a book, but the challenge is to make it all work while being sure everybody is happy.

In the warm and friendly atmosphere created by lots of the colours of fall, and with a sprinkling of Halloween, members were able to talk further with Laura while enjoying treats from The General Store. A special invitation to the store and a chance to win a door prize completed the program.

# Café Femenino Fund Raising Project

A new supply of Café Femenino Coffee will be available at our November  $23^{rd}$  General meeting. All of your favorite blends in both whole bean and drip grind, as well as some Christmas trio packs, will be on sale. This continues to be a great fundraiser for our club as \$4.00 from the sale of each 454 g bag goes to support our Bursary Foundation. The special Trio packs (3 x  $\frac{1}{2}$  lbs.) are a nice gift packed item. The coffee we sell is freshly roasted in Salmon Arm by the Shuswap Coffee Company. It is sent to us directly and is not warehoused.

Café Femenino is a Certified Fair Trade Organic Arabica coffee that is grown and managed exclusively by women farmers in the mountainous regions of Central and South America, and Mexico. It is organically grown without the use of pesticides which makes it bird friendly as well as healthier for the farm workers and their families.

Many girls are now being educated, as prior to the Café Femenino project, it was common practice to educate only the boys in the family. Families are slowly rising out of poverty and creating a better life because for the first time women are in charge of their own money and economic welfare.

We often forget in Canada that many women around the world are not allowed to own anything, have their own money, or make financial decisions for the betterment of themselves and their children.

This is truly an example of one of our main CFUW aims, women helping other women and their families.Your purchase really does make a difference.(Lois Hunter, Project Coordinator)

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## CFUW White Rock/Surrey Glimpses of Our History from the 2000's

We have been looking back at the last six decades of our club's history to see what was happening as we celebrate the important milestone of our 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary since receiving our charter in 1959.

Previous newsletters have the earlier years, and this month we will look at the 2000's. This was the decade when we were led by presidents:

Elva Reid, Jean Putman, Mary Ann Rainer, Gladys Utendale, and Rosemary Zelinka.

To begin the new millennium, plans were initiated to register the club as a society, with much of the groundwork being laid by Marilyn Newman (president from 1998 to 2000). Incoming president Elva Reid launched a strategic plan – Visions – which included reviving the finance committee and instituting a marketing committee. The topic of the program for the first meeting of 2000 was Burns Bog, still a contentious issue. A change in the newsletter format from September 2000 resulted in a slicker and easier to read production. In the first issue, editor Maureen Buchholz, featured a tribute to phone committee coordinator Phyllis Wright and her staff. As well, the website was up and running by the Spring of 2002. A more newsworthy indication of the club's activity was the presentation of 'Bustles to Bell Bottoms', a vintage fashion show.

In August 2001, six members – Doreen Harvey, Lois Hunter, Jean Putman, Gladys Utendale, Betty Huff, and Berta Hugh – attended the IFUW Triennial held in Ottawa. The following year, in keeping with the club's theme, "Building Community Connections: think globally, act locally", the club assisted Richmond club in hosting the national AGM by donating funds for workshops, and providing volunteers to host the workshops and credentials committee. Three members – Mary Fran Bateman, Elizabeth Bordeaux and Helen Christiansen – opened their homes to 45 participants to enjoy "home-hospitality" dinners.

Wider connections were maintained when former club president, Wendy Fidgeon, was elected president of the Board of Directors of the Third Age Learning program (TALK) at Kwantlen College, and Gladys Utendale was named CFUW Regional Director of BC West. In 2003, charter member, Terry Barry prompted the club to join the Adopt-A-Street organization. Members proudly cleaned our designated streets once every 3 months. At this time, even though the personal phone message was still popular, the club made more use of e-mail amongst its members, and created a more user-friendly website. 'Gardens in Bloom' continued to be successful, and for two years the club's quilting group provided a quilt to be raffled. The club was able to donate funds to Women's Place, Peace Arch Community Services, Ama House and the Osteoporosis Society in addition to building up the Bursary Fund.

During Mary Ann Rainer's presidency, the book exchange was initiated at monthly meetings. It later became a small fundraiser by charging two dollars per book. Eventually the surplus books were donated to the annual White Rock Museum book sale. The Education Committee introduced two initiatives: supporting Friends of the Library at Elgin High School, and creating a pre-school and early readers library for children at Camp Alexandria. Deservedly, the club's work was recognized at the 2004 National Conference in Regina, with a Special Projects Award acknowledging the work of the Education Committee and with an Increased Membership Award.

Once again the club participated at the International level with three club members, Gladys Utendale, Marion Setterland, and Jean Putman attending the 2004 Triennial IFUW Conference in Perth, Australia. Also in 2004, the One to One Children's Literacy Project, led by Patricia Hyde, began at H.T. Thrift Elementary School to provide a supportive environment for learning to build each child's self -confidence and literacy skills. In November 2004, Lorraine Ellenwood's Book, Years of Promise, chronicling White Rock's History from 1858 to 1958, was launched. In 2007, in appreciation for the ongoing care and attention, the White Rock Museum & Archives donates to our archival material, the club purchased a plaque in the fundraising project to restore the historic museum building. The Education Committee presented a resolution on child care to BC Council, and Environment & Public Affairs ad hoc committees were established.

Interest groups of biking, walking and choir were added to the already substantial list available to members. Gladys Utendale was appointed Nominations Chair of National, and the club was well represented on the BC Provincial Council. The Parent-Child Mother Goose program, funded through one of the club's 2008 community grants, allowed 12 families to attend a 10-week course designed to support refugee children's early language learning. In addition, several members designed and sewed book bags for the children.

It is clear that the activities of CFUW White Rock/Surrey in the first decade of the 21st century remained true to the principles and vision of our founding president, Jessie Casselman.
