PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

In September, I went on a quick trip to London followed by a tour to Devon and Cornwall, as they had always been on my travel list.

Travel, be it past, armchair, or present, seems to be a favorite activity for club members, and it certainly is not only fun but educational and cultural and a way to keep up with some international affairs and changes in the world. It is another form of continuing education.

London is a favorite city. Everywhere I went on this visit, diversity and new ethnic backgrounds were obvious, even in the South End. My first stop this trip was to get over to the morning line up at TKSK, the key theatre ticket booth, to buy tickets for the West End musical "Motow". Then, after a quick coffee at the Pâtisserie Valerie, I was off to the British Library to renew my three year library card and get in some research on tin mining.

Devon and Cornwall are at their best in September, so it was a thrill to get away early to head first to Windsor and Bath on the way to Bristol. Since I had been to the castle in Windsor, I did a town walk across the bridge to private Eton College and saw that there were still no girls or young women among the 1,300 lads destined for leadership, not just in England but around the world.

Bath was celebrating the Jane Austin Festival, and our hotel in Bristol was across a park with WWII bombed ruins of a church and homeless persons in tents. Then it was lovely countryside, a stately mansion of the 7th Marquess of Bath and the town of Laycock with cottages and 15th C inns (movie location for Pride and Prejudice and Harry Potter). The moorland and coastline were amazing. We had stops at medieval village Dunster, on to fishing town Llfracombe, and later the port town Bideford.

The north Cornish coast, with crashing waves and Tintagel Castle, steeps of King Arthur. A stop at a sheep farm made one realize how hard English farm life is now, and that creative ways for varied income are needed for survival. For example, the young women were combining giving dance and yoga classes with catering. At Plymouth, it was out into the harbour in a boat to see the military's largest destroyers where the Mayflower once left. Then on to the university city of Exeter where we were close to the campus, and music students performed in support of The Churches Conservation Trust. Then it was on to pure Poldark series country - villages, smuggler's coves, abandoned mines and St. Michael's Mount near Penzance. St. Ives was in the middle of its famous music and arts festival, and we went on for dinner in what used to be a monastery on the main road for horse carriages and wagons from London.

It all was far too short as a trip, and the next time I hope to connect with some women graduates in Britain. There are two possibilities for contacts – the University Women's Club of London and the British Federation of University Graduates (BFWG). The former is not associated with Graduate Women's International (GWI). It has been around since the 1880s and has had a fairly unknown house with 22 bedrooms in Mayfair since 1921. Their members are professional, business, student and graduate women. There is a reciprocal agreement for use with our CFUW clubs of Vancouver, Toronto and Montreal. The BFWG has many clubs around England with a national office on Battersea Park Road, and members can hold a university degree or equivalent diploma, licence or certificate from an institution of higher learning. The BFWG was one of the founding members of GWI, and their own membership still includes belonging to both GWI and the University Women of Europe (UWE), a regional member of GWI founded in 1981.

The UWE does advocacy on European issues and, as a regional umbrella, is a network of associations from 19 countries: Austria, Bulgaria, Croatia, Finland, France, Germany, England, Wales, Ireland, Italy, Moldavia, The Netherlands, Norway, Romania, Scotland, Slovenia, Spain, Switzerland, Turkey, and the Turkish Cypriot Association.

It is amazing what a little scouting trip on prehistoric and first century tin mines unfolds!

History of the Canadian Federation of University Women White Rock / Surrey Club



This short history of our club was written to mark our 50th anniversary. Members who were active in each decade have contributed their memories.

THE FIRST DECADE: THE 1960s

Jessie Casselman was undoubtedly the driving force behind the establishment of CFUW White Rock / Surrey. Jessie was both persuasive and persistent, so just about every female university graduate in the area was corralled into joining the new club, which was officially launched on June 18, 1959. For the rest of her life, Jessie was an active member who, each year, formally inducted the new club officers and was a commanding presence at meetings.

Membership in the 60s (at the bargain rate of \$5 a year) stayed at about 50, small enough so that everyone knew each other and meetings could be held in private homes. The locale alternated between White Rock and Panorama Ridge, with the format of a formal meeting and a speaker, followed by refreshments. The

hostess provided tea and coffee, and all the members brought homemade goodies on rotation.

The members were all ages, from young mothers to retired teachers. For the young mums, the club was a godsend, a place of calm and camaraderie where there were stimulating programs and good conversation. For everyone, friendship, mental stimulation and networking were major reasons for joining the White Rock / Surrey University Women's Club

The choice of speakers provoked a certain amount of controversy. Were we a "tea and biscuits" club or an intellectual group? A compromise was reached, with a combination of both at every meeting and one dinner meeting with a speaker, but also two social events without any speakers. There was a Christmas party with games and carol singing, and in June, a family picnic on the Ridge, where the mothers could take their toddlers and enjoy picnicking on the grass.

Even in those very early days, there were active interest groups: a bridge club, a cooking club and two book clubs. Committees were formed to discuss resolutions, one of which dealt with raising the minimum age for marriage in Canada from 14 to 16. The club also embarked on two major community programs in the late 60s: staffing a family planning clinic and running career days at local high schools.

The family planning clinic was not taken on with the approval of all members. Many of the older members were horrified to be supporting a clinic that offered birth control counselling and "the pill" to unmarried women. In those days, no family doctor could discuss birth control without involving the parents, and there were many unwanted pregnancies and illegal abortions with tragic results. The club decided that supporting family planning (and prevention) was preferable to that situation, and for many years we provided clerical and counselling volunteers. Eventually, when laws were changed, the clinic was taken over by the Department of Public Health.

The career days were much less controversial than family planning! They were all-day affairs held at Earl Marriott or Princess Margaret Senior Secondary schools, and our members found and introduced the speakers and provided refreshments. School staff did much of the organizing, so the career days were joint efforts with the schools.

University women have always been active in the community, and our club has provided many notable community leaders. In the 60s, Mary Sandford was a leading light in the Council of Women; Lorraine Amos and Margaret Primrose, founding members of the White Rock Playhouse, were starring on stage, and many of us were playing active roles in Peace Arch Hospital auxiliary groups, Brownies and Guides, and Cubs and Scouts.

Two major conferences for university women took place in the 60s. A provincial conference under the direction of our president, Dorothy Slaughter, was run by our executive, together with the Tsawwassen Club, and a CFUW conference was held at UBC. Both were attended by many of our members.

Small but active throughout the 60s, the White Rock / Surrey club set the standards and sowed the seeds for future growth.

INTEREST GROUP ACTIVITIES

One-on-One Literacy Project (Carolyn Oram)

The purpose of this workshop was to prepare volunteers for the school year and their work with the students at both H.T. Thrift and Peace Arch Elementary



schools. There were 16 participants who really enjoyed Linda's presentation, and they felt that she shared some excellent new reading strategies.

We began our sessionsOctober 11, and continue until December 1. In January, we commence session two, and in April we start session three. We are most fortunate to have a full schedule of volunteers at each school, and a list of volunteers that we can call on to substitute when necessary. Sexual Assault on Campus

In September, CFUW National submitted a brief to the Status of Women Committee for their Study on Violence against Young Women and Girls in Canada. The brief focused on the danger women face on university and college campuses. In the brief they discussed rape culture, lack of institutional support and victim services, and what the government can do to address these issues. The government will study the CFUW brief and has posted it to its website.

GWI Updates

Following the GWI Triennial General Assembly held in Capetown, South Africa, on Aug. 21-23, 2016, a memo from Karen Dunnett, CFUW National President, provided us with the following information about dues:

"...our GWI dues rate increase will be 9 Swiss Francs (CHF) for 2017, 5 CHF for 2018, and 5 CHF for 2019."

.... Our (CFUW) bylaws state:

"Annual per capita dues shall be set by a special motion passed at an annual general meeting. Written notice outlining any proposed changes to the dues shall be sent to all Clubs at least one hundred and twenty (120) calendar days prior to the annual general meeting."

This means that **no** CFUW national membership dues increase can take place this 2016- 2017 fiscal year.

Please note as well that the board has another report to do. It is the report that was requested via a motion made at the CFUW 2016 AGM and Conference. The motion stated:

"In light of the close majority vote on June 24, 2016 with respect to Amendment #2 from St Thomas and the upcoming Triennial GWI meeting in Cape Town, we kindly request the Board to complete a report no later than 6 months after the GWI Triennial meeting in Cape Town to propose a proactive way ahead for CFUW." On behalf of the board, I wanted you to know that the committee has been struck...We want to ensure that we gather as much information as possible, understand all the implications and explore numerous avenues in order to deal with our financial issues and fulfil the request for a proactive report going forward, while keeping the timeline as tight as possible to deliver the report"
