PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The days are suddenly so short that it seems dark by early afternoon, and it's time to turn on the lights around the house. Imagine, centuries ago, when the nights got longer and colder, and the days got shorter. How would people try to keep away the dark? In rituals that predated Christianity, they'd gather evergreen boughs, light bonfires and burn torches. When Christianity came, the rituals were modified, but remained. They burned yule logs, and brought evergreen trees into their houses. In Germany, they began adding candles to the trees for light. These symbols followed us to the "new world" and were joined by even more traditions - turkey dinners, Santa Claus, Jesus in the manger, Christmas carols.

CFUW has always had a focus on childhood poverty. In 1989, the government of Canada made a commitment to "end childhood poverty" by the year 2000. Sadly, that didn't happen. Here in B.C., we have an abysmal record on the issue. In 2011, B.C. had the highest rate of childhood poverty in Canada, with one in five children considered "statistically poor".

The rest of the year, there are agencies that do their best to help these children, but the effects of poverty are felt most harshly at Christmas. Will these children get a good meal, or a special present? What do they - and their families - do to keep the dark away during this season? What could we as a club or as individuals do this year to help these smallest victims of the grinding cycle of poverty?

So let's give to those less fortunate and make sure that others get a good meal. Then let's gather our family members around us, light the lights and keep the dark at bay, for one more year. Merry Christmas to each and every member, Happy Holidays, and many more ahead!



WENDY FIDGEON



FULLY BOOKED BOOK CLUB

Members of the FULLY BOOKED BOOK CLUB spent a fun and laughter-filled afternoon when they discussed "The Wily O'Reilly", Irish Country Stories, a collection of humorous columns written for Canadian and Irish publications by Dr. Patrick Taylor. The stories - more vignettes than short stories - were a fun read, full of Irish humour.

The story of Maggie, one of O'Reilly's patients, was a favourite of most of the group. Maggie complained of headaches that were two inches above her head. Never one to suffer fools gladly, O'Reilly finally gave her a bottle of vitamin pills, told her to take one capsule ten minutes before the headache came on and sent her home.

Dr. Taylor, the author, came to Canada in 1970 to work on human fertility and received many awards for his work in that field. At present, he is a retired medical researcher, professor emeritus at UBC and bestselling novelist. Kirkus Reviews says of him "What Herriot did for Yorkshire, Taylor does for Northern Ireland.... minus the animals."

Patrick Taylor lives on Salt Spring Island, and is publishing his tenth book

On entering the "country house" in the middle of East Vancouver, you are met by a pyramid of glossy, ceramic apples piled y large, autumnal paper mache tree in the

on top of a table and a very large, autumnal paper mache tree in the middle of the livingroom. Everywhere you turn, there are works of art in oils, sculpture, and velum (painted to look like bolts of material) so realistic you are drawn to touching them.



For over 80 years, Gathie (Agatha) Falk's work has encompassed music, performance art, and the visual arts. Her skill is in taking ordinary objects, capturing their power,

then transforming them into art. But she is also capable of taking the extraordinary and transforming it into the ordinary. For example, she explained how she observed that the men in her circle of family and friends gravitated toward a certain pattern and style of shirt. She was so taken by their personal choice of plaids and stripes she set to work expressing their personalities in a series of unique, life-size paper mache shirts.

Her home is the backdrop for massive canvases and works, some sinister, like the "Wedding Veils" displayed in her second floor loft. This workroom is filled with light from clerestory windows and adjoins her bedroom where even the clothes cupboard doors have whimsical drawings. The main floor is reminiscent of a European home with a basic kitchen, combined living/dining area and, again, wonderful use of light throughout. Gathie talked about designing the house just 25 years ago 'though it feels timeless. Who better to capture the essence of light and space.

Her niece, artist and CFUW member Susan Falk, describes having someone so artistic in the family is "incredible, mysterious and awe inspiring. These are words that come to mind since my earliest childhood memories," said Susan. "Her work ethic and professionalism in this industry are two things that I have learned the most from her. That, and a lesson on how to stretch canvas!"

Walking out-of-doors to her studio in the back garden, we move past laundry drying on a line and irreplaceable works of art and sculpture cast amidst the plants. The studio houses a hand-crafted aluminum canoe, her second. The larger original took three years to complete and is now in the National Gallery of Canada.

We, as an Art Appreciation Group, talked over coffee and, for an hour and a half, we looked at the world through the mind of an artist who continues to explore every medium with passion and insight. Marilyn Dyer presented the theory session for Art: The Theatre of the Mind and Gathie regaled us with her fascinating, personal art stories. It was a rich, sensory experience for all.

CFUW NEWS UPDATE

- The small Quebec Club is organizing the CFUW Annual General Meeting (AGM) in Quebec City, June 18-25, 2015. National President Doris Mae Oulton visited the site and was impressed with the club's energy.
- There are 4.5 staff members at the CFUW National Office in Ottawa. They are Robin Jackson Executive Director, Betty Dunlop – Fellowships Manager (they get about 400 applications), Tara Fisher – Advocacy Coordinator, Gayle Betrand – Member Services and Communications Director and Ryszard Kowalshi – part-time Accounting and Software Developer.
- CFUW National Office is bilingual.
- This year the deadline was extended from Nov. 1 to Nov. 7 for the 2015-16 CFUW National Fellowships and Awards Applications. There is a filing fee of \$60.
- CFUW has merchandise which may be of use to clubs: ceramic mug, window decal, logo button, notebook, note cards, metal pen, key ring, card holder, carabiner and a scarf. All can be purchased through the National Office.
- For clubs who need brochures for local membership recruitment National Office has free items: a 2014 membership recruitment brochure and a 2013 student membership brochure.

CFUW BC Council & Clubs Update

"If not you, who will act?"

- All BC Clubs (if able) are being asked to consider story-telling with local women and from local women in club communities at-large – regarding the care of children/child care. The reports from the clubs will go to the BC Council.
- Reminder: November 15 is Election Day in municipalities across the province.
- BC spends just 0.2% of GDP on early child care and learning vs. the 0.7% average by other developed countries.
- The Saanich Peninsula Club had a presentation by a local historian who spoke on the lives and experiences of some of Victoria's Nursing Sisters who treated wounded soldiers near the battlefields of the First World War. The event was covered by the local newspaper.
- The Abbotsford Club is hosting the 2016 Provincial AGM. The club meets the first Monday of the month at 7 pm at the University House at the University of Fraser Valley UFV). They have a Scholarship Endowment Fund of \$65,000 with tax receipts and this year presented a \$1,500 scholarship to a mature female student at UFV.
- The 42nd Christmas at Hycroft (Vancouver Club in an Edwardian clubhouse) is November 20- 23 (daily 11-9, Sunday 11-6). Valet parking (\$5), boutiques, local artisans, bistro food etc. Admission \$15. 1489 McRae Ave (off Granville), Vancouver.

- President Catherine Bell, by way of a letter, described Malala Yousafzai, winner of the Nobel Peace Prize (with Kailash Satyarthi) as "a model for all girls."
- November 25 is the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women.
- "Global Gender Gap Report 2014" by the World Economic Forum, stated that it may take until 2095 before the gender gap (health, education, economy and politics) is closed completely. The narrowest gap is in education at 96% while political empowerment only is at 21%.
