

# CLUB NEWS

### '60 Million Girls' - Presentation at CFUW October 2016 Meeting

Our speaker at the October meeting was Paula Gallagher, representing 60 Million Girls, a volunteer organization to help educate illiterate young women, particularly those in sub-Saharan Africa.

It is estimated that over one hundred and ten million children don't have access to primary education. Over sixty million of those are girls.

Paula stated that when a woman works outside the home, she re-invests over 90% of her income into her family, while a man re-invests only 30% of his income, with the remainder going to other outlets.

In sub-Saharan Africa, a poor, rural girl is nine times less likely to go to school than the richest boys. A child whose mother can read is five times less likely to die before the age of five. Every additional year of primary school boosts a girl's income earning potential by ten to twenty percent, while an extra year of secondary school can boost her income by fifteen to

twenty five percent. Girls with an education tend to marry later and have smaller and healthier families. They are three times less likely to become HIV positive.

60 Million Girls is a Montreal based charity with a small budget, raised through donations. Projects include school construction, teacher training, provision of equipment and the support of activities to increase girls' access to school. Only one percent of the money they raise goes to administrative costs.

Since they're working on a small budget, they try to make good use of technology wherever possible. One of the devices they use is called a "Raspberry Pi", a small, inexpensive device (around \$120) that can fit in

the palm of your hand. It is a solid state hard drive preloaded with thousands of books and illustrations as well as other educational materials. It has a built in wifi network which acts as a server for up to 30 devices. Since many of the locations for these activities have no electricity, the schools are equipped with solar panels to run the wifi and recharge the tablets used by the students. One Raspberry device and a supply of \$100 tablets can provide educational materials for an entire school.

The organization believes that "blended learning" is the best way to reach marginalized children, using a combination of traditional in-class schooling and independent computer based learning. 60 Million Girls is an effective tool to increase levels of education, and better the lives of children in Africa.

Leading a rather domesticated city life while growing up in Vancouver, it never occurred to me that I would later come to love so many other areas of B.C.



## NEWS FROM THE NATIONAL OFFICE

### Special General Meeting Jan. 30, 2017

A Special General Meeting of the Canadian Federation of University Women (CFUW), as per Articles and Bylaws M88, will be held on **Monday, January 30, 2017 from 3:00 p.m. ET to 5:00 p.m. Pacific Time** for the purpose of **discussing CFUW's response to GWI's dues increase.** Please note that the Special General Meeting will be held electronically. Further details will follow. (CFUW National President Karen Dunnett)

- **Background:** Graduate Women International (GWI) (formerly IFUW) is an international network linking women graduates with affiliates in many countries. CFUW is included in this network. GWI has voted to increase member fees; this increase will impact CFUW fees. At the June 2016 CFUW AGM in Ontario, a motion was put forth for CFUW to withdraw affiliation with GWI. 55% of the votes were in favour of withdrawing, 45% were opposed. The motion was defeated as according to CFUW bylaws, a 2/3 majority vote is needed.
- Continuing CFUW's affiliation with GWI will necessitate an increase in CFUW member dues. Any
  increase in CFUW fees must be taken to all of the CFUW clubs for a vote, and then subsequently
  voted upon at the AGM. The special electronic meeting in January will allow an opportunity for
  discussion of how the GWI fee increase will affect CFUW fees and allow time for discussion prior to
  the AGM in June.
- Further Information on Fees Breakdown: CFUW National Annual Fees paid to GWI (formerly IFUW)

**2015:** \$161,946

**2016:** \$173,697. This amount will increase in 2017, 2018 and 2019.

- How do our individual member fees contribute? Club fees vary across Canada. As members of CFUW White Rock/South Surrey, we pay an annual membership fee of \$100.00 to our club, of which \$70.00 is paid to the National Office. All clubs pay \$70.00 per member in dues to the National Office to support expenses. From every \$70.00 annual fee, the breakdown is as follows:
  - **\$18.41** Graduate Women International (26.3%)
  - **\$33.88** Operations and Programs (48.4%)
  - **\$ 5.39** Governance (7.7%)
  - **\$12.11** CFUW Annual General Meeting and conference expenses (17.3%)
  - **\$21.00** Capital Expenses (.3%)
