PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Some may consider looking through a catalogue is something that was only done in the past.

Years ago, when as a youngster visiting various family farms with my parents, I came to realize that those outside of urban areas relied on catalogues and that catalogues also were forms of learning and entertainment.

Then, as a student in the summer work force between studies, I relied on that late spring job with Eaton's Catalogue Division in Winnipeg to earn funds for fall tuition. It was an eye opener to be in the punch-theclock workforce without extensive labour rights.

On our first break in the lunchroom, the supervisor ordered the newbies not to work any faster than Mary Jane who had been in our section for 24 years! But especially noteworthy was the substitution rule by the firm, which was that if the paper order in our hands was for an item not in stock, we were to substitute it for another more expensive one. One presumes that the idea was a form of a loss leader, and the person who ordered and received a substitution would give many praises for Eaton's in their community, and many others would place orders.

Since then there have been other catalogues I have looked at, such as Sears, Simpsons, some for American clothing brands, for tools, Ikea, and the many for travel tours, river and ocean cruises. I still cherish owning the Christmas, Fall and Winter 1975 catalogues for the now defunct Eaton's.

So imagine my delight when our club ordered the Vesey's Bulbs catalogue which is also a fundraising tool with a 50% profit! I have spent hours with the catalogue – daydreaming of a spring like garden that is a wonderland compared to my own last year. Off from forgotten shelves came backup resources such as Chatelaine's Gardening Book by Lois Wilson, and a gift from my daughter A Gardener's Journal (a five

year record).

Vesey's spring bulbs, flower seeds and edibles even have products and ideas that I have never tried. The bird bath could use a flower ring around it. I had never heard of a seed mat, and how is it that I have missed out over past years on such a simple solution?

In the past, our club supported a resolution to help preserve our pollinators (birds, bees, butterflies, beneficial insects). I have had good intentions to plant all that is possible to assist the bees and butterflies. In vain I tried the library, immersing myself in the few texts, such as The Bee Friendly Garden by a writer with the US Pollinator Partnership, and others. Yet, here it was right in Canada, a solution to my procrastination, from Vesey's in Charlottetown – a honey bee seed mat and a butterfly seed mat!

Now, I am making a list of gardening friends and neighbours to show them the colourful catalogue and see if they would like to add their small or large orders to mine, or have their own order; plus, in doing so, also to assist our club.

Program: Closing the Gap: Early Childhood Education and Childcare in Surrey/White Rock

Families in our communities face many challenging factors that prohibit them from accessing quality child care and early learning experiences. The gap continues to widen for vulnerable children to become successful learners. The goal of the collaborative work being done in our communities is to bridge this gap.

Our two presenters, Christy Northway and Gerard Bremault, will provide an overview of current data throughout Surrey and White Rock and help us understand the key factors and need for affordable and quality childcare, as the early years of a child's life impact their future learning potential.

Our guest speakers:

Gerard Bremault, a registered social worker, has been the CEO of the Centre for Child Development and Child Development Foundation of BC for almost 15 years. The centre is a non-profit organization that works with children with special needs. Gerard also oversees Sophie's Place, a child advocacy group that provides specialized services to physically, mentally and sexually abused children up to age 18. In addition to his leadership role at the Centre for Child Development, Gerard's experience as a business leader provides him with the qualifications to hold the position of Governor (past chair) of the Surrey Board of Trade.

Christy Northway, is the Assistant Superintendent-Newton, Surrey School District, currently responsible for elementary and secondary schools in the Newton area. She holds many additional responsibilities including Learning by Design and K-12 curriculum and assessment. Surrey School District has long been a leader in coordinating a community focus for Early Childhood Education and continues its partnership with various community and ministry agencies. In previous years, Christy has held the positions of elementary school teacher; Early Literacy Teacher; principal in Newton and in South Surrey/White Rock; District Principal for Early Learning and Literacy and an Assistant Superintendent-South Surrey/White Rock.

Christy and Gerard currently sit on the Surrey Child Care Task Force, which is comprised of members from the school district, City of Surrey, Fraser Health, provincial ministries and several agencies.

Be sure to attend this meeting to discover and explore ways we can support the goals and actions of early learning advocates for the children in our communities.

United Nations Commission on Status of Women - Meetings in New York City, March 2017

- Our club co-vice president, Diane Salter Menzo, will join the National CFUW Delegation to participate in the United Nations Status of Women Committee in New York in March, 2017.
- The United Nations Commission on the Status of Women (CSW) is the principal global • intergovernmental body exclusively dedicated to the promotion of gender equality and the empowerment of women. The Canadian Federation of University Women (CFUW) is a Non-Government Organization (NGO) with consultative status with the United Nations. A delegation of CFUW members from across Canada will actively participate in the discussions at CSW61 in New York in March, 2017.
- The priority theme at the UNSWC this year is 'Women's economic empowerment in the changing world of work'. Diane will be joined by Cheryl Hayles, VP International, CFUW National Board and Dr. Madeline Kalbach, VP Membership, CFUW National Board and Professor Emiritus, Department of Sociology, University of Calgary, and will give a panel presentation entitled: 'Mentorship in the Changing World of Work'. They will report on the CFUW Mentorship program. The goal of the program is to enable women entering the careers in Science. Technology, Arts, Engineering and Medicine (STEAM), Politics and Organizational Leadership to learn from women who are experienced in these fields. Joining them on the panel are Ashli Akins, Founder and President of Mosqoy who will discuss the importance of empowering women in Peru and how mentoring may help with these goals and Raine Liliefeldt from the YMCA Canada, who will discuss how mentoring can help to prepare young women and girls for success in the workforce.

"Attendance at UNCSW61 is a wonderful opportunity to meet women from around the world, discuss matters of common concern, and bring back information and new perspectives on issues that affect women and girls to our local community. (Diane Salter-Menzo)

Additional Background on CFUW involvement with the UNSWC

- The active participation of non-governmental organizations (NGOs), such as the Canadian Federation of University Women, is a critical element in the work of the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW). NGOs have been influential in shaping the current global policy framework on women's empowerment and gender equality: the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action. They continue to play an important role in holding international and national leaders accountable for the commitments they made in the Platform for Action http://www.unwomen.org/en/csw/ngoparticipation#sthash.ex0VFI0G.dpuf.
- Even in wealthy countries like Canada, women's economic empowerment, equal pay, affordable child care and access to retraining can be elusive, and women are significantly under-represented in positions of decision making and leadership in the changing world of work. When you look closer at the progress of aboriginal women, women with disabilities and racialized women, the picture becomes even more dismal.
- In the lead up to this session, UN member states were asked to undertake an internal assessment
 of their progress in the 17 Sustainable Development Goals identified to reach gender equity by
 2030. Indeed, across the board, progress has been slow and uneven, with some countries much
 further behind than others. With the support of non-government organizations such as the
 Canadian Federation of University Women the urgency of meeting these goals motives delegates
 such as myself to advocate for countries like Canada to take the lead in committing to accelerating
 progress for women and girls in all 17 Sustainable Development Goals.
- CFUW is a non-partisan, voluntary, self-funded organization with over 100 CFUW Clubs, located in every province across Canada. Since its founding in 1919, CFUW has worked to improve the status of women, and to promote human rights, public education, social justice, and peace. As a Non-Government Organization with consultative status with the United Nations, the CFUW delegation will actively participate in the discussions at CSW61. It is the hope of CFUW that an agreement will be reached on how developed and developing countries can work together to accelerate progress and ensure that gender equality and women's empowerment.
