
Decluttering and Downsizing



This article chronicles the history of "Gardens In Bloom", a garden tour which became the club's signature annual fundraising event for several years.

Prior to the Gardens in Bloom tours, much of the club fundraising came from efforts such as raffles, silent auctions, donations, and public meetings with interesting speakers. One source of a small amount of revenue came from the tradition of passing a ceramic owl called "Share Owl" at meetings for donations as a "thank you" for sharing a ride or a special event that a member shared with the rest of the club. (Jan 1998 newsletter). Casino

funds became available in the 1990's but came with the stipulation that the total must be given out in the year obtained in the form of bursaries, so any monies received did not result in a build-up of the Bursary Foundation or general revenues.

The January 1999 newsletter reported that at a club interest group, called "The Art of Fundraising", the speaker was Lenore Gilchrist who spoke of many successful fundraising strategies including a garden tour, sponsored by the local Hospital Auxiliary. Queries were made and followed up mainly by Jean Putman, to Marlene Gurevitch and the Hospital group, to find out what was involved. Marilyn Newman, who was club president from 1998 to 2000, was instrumental in having this fundraiser taken over by our club. Many club members such as Jean Putman, Wendy Fidgeon, Mary Fran Bateman, Patricia Hyde, and Helen Christiansen, to name a few, were avid gardeners, so this was readily accepted by the club.

The first Gardens in Bloom was held in June of 1999. Six local gardens were featured in this self- guided tour. Jean Putman and Rosemary Kimmell co-chaired the event and \$4,700 was raised. The second GIB was held June 11, 2000, with Jean Putman & Libby Wilson co-ordinating.

In 2003, the annual Gardens in Bloom tour raised over \$13,000 and the attendance doubled. A committee worked several months in advance and most of the club members were involved in some way – re-potting perennials for the plant sale, selling tickets, or sitting at the garden entrances to greet visitors. Smart vests with the club logo were worn to identify our members. Success also came from great publicity and wonderful gardens. The profits were split with 70% going to the Bursary Foundation and 30% to Community Grants.

From the newsletter of April/May 1995, the club had some previous experience in putting on a garden tour. Our club worked with the Mission/Abbotsford CFUW clubs to sponsor a garden tour featuring 6 gardens in the South Surrey/White Rock area on May 20/1995. Mary Fran Bateman was club president and other co-coordinators included Wendy Fidgeon, Gail Edwardson, and Betty Huff.

Gardens In Bloom continued on an annual basis until 2008. In that year, after considerable thought, the committee decided that the annual fundraiser would not occur due to the difficulty in finding suitable gardens. Many of the best larger gardens began to disappear as there was rampant development starting in the area. Any owners of small gardens were reluctant to have 700+ visitors tour their gardens.

This very successful fundraiser did much to raise the profile of our club and involve the membership in a most worthwhile project.

ART APPRECIATION - VISIT TO A STUDIO IN LANGLEY

Last week, I had the pleasure of attending a wonderful gathering organized by CFUW Art Appreciation Group coordinator, Mari Dyer. I was a guest and made to feel welcome by all.

We met at the home of Suzanne Northcott and David Kimura in Langley. Suzanne is a painter and a photographer and has recently started working with textiles and clothing. David is a sculptor, a photographer, a

landscape architect and an inventor. Their home is a little treasure that was built in the 1940s as a country retreat by the family who created Vancouver's VanDusen Gardens. The house is still much the way it was when it was built in 1940 with many delightful touches and even has a sawdust-burning stove in the kitchen (beside the more modern stove). The living room has big windows and a wonderful view across the valley to Mt. Baker. Suzanne and David consider themselves custodians of this unique and inspiring property.

And, of course, the house is filled with the couple's artistic creations – paintings, sculptures, photographs and more.

Our guide, Mari Dyer Seidel, opened the gathering with inspiring words about upcoming arts events and, because the theme was fabrics, textiles and clothes, she showed us some of the beautiful fabrics she has collected from all over the world.

Suzanne then introduced the group to the most recent place her muse has taken her. She has started on a new creative venture taking previously worn clothes and giving them new life.

Suzanne's inspirations for this new venture began with two converging events: her husband David's gardening pants were wearing out; and she learned that the clothing industry is the second biggest polluter in the world.

So, rather than throw David's jeans away and buy a new pair, Suzanne was inspired to create something unique. To fix David's jeans, she cut patches out of beautiful materials and attached them with a striking hand-sewing technique that originated in ancient Japan called Sashiko. It is a form of Japanese folk embroidery.

Suzanne is now scouring second hand stores to find just the right pieces to create unique clothes for people to wear. Some of what she finds will be used for patches and some will re-created into new garments. Her favourite pieces at this time are old work clothes. She showed the group a dark blue welder's suit out of which she'd created a jacket which she then patched with her signature patches.

Seeing Suzanne's creations was truly inspiring for a number of reasons: she is taking steps to help the planet and she is encouraging others to do the same. She is helping to readjust people's thinking by making it acceptable and chic to own re-created second-hand clothes, and above all, she is creating beautiful wearable art.


