Program: What 'Tattoo', the Painted Horse, has Taught us about Bullying



Marilyn Dyer-Seidel's life-size horse statue, *Tattoo*, was vandalized twice very viciously as it stood in Brookswood Park. She soon realized that these criminal acts had a societal cause, and it was bullying. Using her artistic ability, she illustrated the damage of these events, and wrote the story of *Tattoo's* plight. The book had already had provincewide attention by government and school boards. It has led to powerful statements about bullying.

The beautifully illustrated book is being published now, and Mari hopes to have copies available at the meeting. We also plan to mount

the twenty-seven 10"x20" illustrations from the book, which are true works of art.

Tattoo is a powerful story of an ugly and very disturbing problem in modern society, which Mari is addressing in her own unique way. It will be a short address, as Mari hopes to generate a discussion amongst members, our guests, and invited artists from the community.

THE HISTORY OF ONE OF OUR CFUW CLUB TREASURES

Jay Donald has been compiling an inventory of our stored CFUW items and asked about our Club gavel. I am happy to report that the gavel is part of our archival collection at the White Rock Museum & Archives.



The Museum has completed an extensive revitalization project of the 1912 train station that provides larger collections and archival storage areas. Our White Rock/Surrey CFUW Club contributed to this project, and we have our own engraved brass "Train Plaque" as a permanent legacy on the promenade in front of the station.

The Club's gavel, which was used for many years, was turned over to the Museum for integration into our archival records and memorabilia in 2011. This wooden gavel, in a protective case, was presented to the Club by charter member, Miss Edith Pullan,

B.A.Sc. (Nursing UBC 1948). The gavel and case were carved by her father for use of Club Presidents from the start of our Club in 1958. As recent Club Presidents did not wish to use the gavel, it was felt to be more safely stored at the Museum where it is available, should we need it.

Welcome, Karen Peplow


I was born in New Westminster and lived in Maillardville and Coquitlam until I went to the University of British Columbia.

Then, I flew home through South-East Asia visiting the Borobudor Temple in central Java and the temples of Bali. After having visited Bangkok, Phnom Penh in Cambodia, Hong Kong, Tokyo, and Fairbanks, Alaska, I settled into a library clerk's position at the UBC Main Library and completed a B.A. in History. After I left the UBC library,I completed my Education Degree and

started work as a Teacher-On-Call with the Vancouver District.

I was completing my Diploma in Library Education when I was asked to join three other people to evaluate books for the B. C. Non-Fiction Book Prize for 1992. After seven years working as a Teacher-Librarian and teaching Consumer Education, I took my M.ED. in Teacher-Librarianship and taught half-time Library, Social Studies 9 & 10, and ESL at Riverside Secondary. It was the result of my interest with the International & ESL students that I took my diploma in ESL and developed three district award winning programs to help these students adjust to Canadians and Canadian society: *the Host Program; the Korean Drummers; and the Multicultural Club.*

I retired in June of 2012, but continued my love affair with old temples, churches and nature, with student trips to Tanzania and the Ngorongoro Crater, Ephasis in Turkey, and Florence in Italy. At the end of January, 2015, I finally made the move to White Rock and look forward to participating in the rich culture that residents have developed in this area while enjoying the sunrises and sunsets over the water.

We will miss hearing about the causes she was passionate about – often getting involved ourselves – and we will miss her enormous contributions to our club.

To quote her family, Elva was a friend, a mother, an aunt, a grandmother, a sister, a partner, a mentor, a confidante, a gardener. She had a razor sharp intellect, was inquisitive, funny and adventurous and loved everyone she met. She led fund raising and was central in creating the Tong Louie Surrey YMCA, she ran the Tiny-Y Pre School, taught new ECE teachers at Douglas College and at UBC, was active in her PEO group, the White Rock/Surrey branch of the Canadian Federation of University Women, the Surrey Historical Society, and Third Age Learning at Kwantlen College (TALK). She was a greeter at the 2010 Vancouver Olympics and a huge supporter of the Crescent Beach Swimming Club. She was on the board at Alexandra Neighbourhood House and was a long-time gardener at the Dunsmuir Garden. Her accomplishments were truly extraordinary.

Our club has lost an outstanding member who will be remembered with great respect and affection by us all.

Art Appreciation Group Visit to Deborah Putman's Studio

"Totem: From the Boreal"

When we Art Appreciation members entered Deborah Putman's studio on March 18, the paintings on the walls grabbed our attention and didn't let go. Our intrepid leader, Mari, suggested three times that we pour ourselves a cup of coffee and sit down before we unglued our attention from the walls and found our seats.

Then Mari asked each of us to draw a tree on a small piece of paper. After about two minutes the drawings were spread out, so we could look at them as Mari talked about how the subconscious in each of us "sees" trees differently. Each of our drawings was unique and that gave us a personal connection to the unique paintings hanging around us. We began to think about the role of the subconscious in art. And so we were expertly primed. This meant, when Deborah began to speak, her words landed in us.

Deborah told us she very much believes in the subconscious. So, she meditates before she paints. She listens for a word, an image or a beginning sense of something that continues to unfold as she spreads the paint. Llamas down the street, budding branches in the yard, dogs, turtles, owls, ravens and the lions of her dreams are just some of the many things that feed her subconscious.

I was mesmerized by a series of 12 square canvases. Deborah painted the top of something on one canvas, the middle of that thing on another canvas and then the bottom of the same image on the third canvas. What is unique is she hangs the bottom of one image below the middle of a different image and so on, so they don't "go together" in the rational mind. I sat there recombining all the different parts to see if I could figure out what matched. What surprised me was this didn't feel gimmicky and neither was it frustrating. I suspect it put me in a meditative state where I enjoyed the feeling embedded in the oneness of everything even while my mind playfully insisted on matching parts. Since the images came from subconscious meditation why wouldn't they invoke that in the viewer? That's what is so powerful about alive images—they bypass the head and go straight to the heart.

Our group went from a feast for the eyes at Deborah's to a feast for the belly at Sheila's Bistro. Deliciousness all around and good company too.

Deborah just finished showing some of her work at the Surrey Art Gallery. April 16 to June 8 she will be exhibiting and selling at the Amelia Douglas Gallery at Douglas College in New Westminster. That show is titled *Icons:Sacred and Profane*.

- CFUW Victoria developed an 'After Five Network' to engage members at multiple levels who are still working. Included are: sharing work opportunities, revamping the website and social media, modernizing and branding, as well as attracting and retaining new members.
- Linda Lehr is President of CFUW North Vancouver, and Phyllis Scott is Chair of the Issues and Advocacy Interest group CFUW North Vancouver and CFUW West Vancouver.

IFUW Update

- At the past Istanbul Triennium, a decision was made by 68% of the membership to maintain a central office in Geneva with staff to respond to the various functions of the organization.
- Only 30% of all science researchers and 12% of all engineers are female.
- The next IFUW Board meeting in Geneva is April 19 23, 2015.
- The Women Graduates Union Mumbai (a branch of the Indian Federation of University Women's Association) held a panel discussion on domestic violence. It included education as empowerment to prevent or deal with domestic violence, how to deal with violence behind closed doors and legal recourse.
