## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

One of the shocks about retirement is adjusting one's expectations.

For many seniors the income flow is less while prices and services continue to rise. An income level may drop from 100% to 66%, or 50%. If one wants (wants versus needs) some rewards for those hard working years, travel or other reward-related expenses mean that there has to be a higher income in retirement. There are also new expenses

while we are on our retirement journey - exploring new activities, crafts, arts, new ways to volunteer, advocate and even exercise.

As well, there are emotional pressures to assist younger generations in close or extended families with mortgages, education, a financial crisis or period of financial instability. Also, to have to stretch severely a retirement income due to one's chronic health or that of one's spouse or partner.

Life expectancy for seniors is rising and there are concerns for some that they may outlive their saved and/or invested assets.

Will their children be able to afford to assist them for the costs of a bed or small suite in an assisted living facility when one may be in the eighty-five plus category? Or will the health care have changed bringing greater charges and changes? By 2030, there will only be two workers per retired person. It is a surprise for those who are 65 now to have to ponder what it will be like when they are 85!

Since 2000, Canadians have slipped into the habit of having our consumption and expenditures rise more than our personal income flows. Has this habit even slipped into how we regard the finances of our levels of government and even the organizations that we may belong to? Do we even know how much we rob Peter to pay Paul (pay our bills and balance our budgets by dipping into reserves/savings, contingency funds of various kinds) due to risks, maxing out credit cards, lines of credit, remortgaging, and adding to debt for future generations? At the same time as a "have" democracy and citizens in it, we turn away from

the fact that we are blessed compared to others around the globe. Only 22% of workers worldwide feel that they will have enough money to pay for the basics of food, shelter and clothing as seniors (Global Worldwide Study).

As CFUW members, we all do put effort into our own continued literacy and are encouraging it in our own families and in the schools. But what about financial literacy? How financially savvy are we? And if we are not, how can we be and then how can we mentor or assist those in our families and in the community-atlarge, or even in our own club and our national CFUW? Diane and I will be attending and voting at the National CFUW annual General Meeting (AGM) in late June. Most of the thorny national and international issues are about finance. Our hope is that there will be enough voting representatives present with financial literacy and problem solving skills to assist National CFUW getting back on reduced risk and a sustainable financial track.

In our fine club, we are not alone in any present or future challenges as one of many BC clubs and other clubs across Canada. We have our 60<sup>th</sup> ahead of us in 2019 to celebrate and the hope that our club continues to be financially healthy and sustainable for many more decades. Yes, transition towards and then being in retirement is much more than just about money or concerns about risk. Members are models to each other of how there are new stages in life to have freedom, to awaken and explore new personal and collective horizons while staying engaged with the needs around us and our input into assisting others related to our shared goals and objectives.

The saying now is that retirement years could be for three decades, and that our social network or fellowship is key to continued life satisfaction. Our club seems like one of the better \$29 local annual fee deals around, plus the \$1 for the BC Council (we hold our insurance through it as well) and the \$70 for National/International. Why not take a minute to consider what you have enjoyed or what has been enriching in the activities and fellowship of our CFUW club over the past year?

Remember to renew your membership at or before the May 24 AGM; avoid a late fee by paying your \$100 before June 30.

### **CFUW NATIONAL**

#### **Response to GWI Fees Increase**

The 'Way Forward' Report was circulated to members in Feb. and is available on the CFUW National web site in the members' area. Our club formed a small group who reviewed this document. 32 Clubs and 28 individuals from across Canada responded to the Report. National has formed a task force committee composed of Grace Hollett as Chair with Board members-Dominique Racanelli, Bilkies McKen and Janet Willwerth. The mandate of the follow up Committee is to recommend: "proposals that would move CFUW forward and enhance its growth including proposals on which action should be taken with time lines and financial implications". The work of the task force will be completed by May 1, 2017. The recommendations and responses to the Report will be made available to the membership shortly thereafter.

GWI Fees Payments (excerpted from the message from Grace Hollet, National President, dated March 30, 2017)

• In January of this year CFUW paid the first half of the regular 2017 dues to GWI. This payment did not include the GWI dues increase.

At a special National Board meeting held on March 29, the following motion was presented, debated, and carried:

- "Moved that the second half of the GWI dues be paid by March 31, 2017."
- That second payment of regular dues, again without the dues increase will be made to GWI today. The funds for both payments were collected last year and converted to Swiss Francs (CHF) by

CFUW's Executive Director at an opportune time in the money market.

This decision of the CFUW Board to pay the second half of the GWI dues at this time, is not tied to GWI's dues increase or to CFUW's future relationship with GWI. The matter of the dues increase is being passed over by GWI to an ad hoc committee that they will constitute this month and I have indicated that CFUW is interested in being part of that committee. CFUW's membership in GWI will be a decision of you the members, who are considering this issue in your Clubs in preparation for when the proposed Bylaw amendment is debated and voted by delegates at the 2017 AGM in June.

CFUW Richmond is the host for this year's National AGM. An exciting program is planned with the theme of 'Gateways/Passerelles'. Many interesting pre and post conference events are planned as well as a jam-packed program.
