# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Although times were challenging, with covid restrictions continuing much longer than any of us envisioned, I feel that we achieved our goals. One of the topics raised this year was the need to review the branding of 'CFUW'. When CFUW began, the club was created for women university graduates. However, in recognition that there are many roads to higher education, the requirement of a university degree was dropped many years ago. Many members, locally and nationally, feel that continuing to use the word 'University' in our name is a deterrent. Potential members often mistakenly believe that the club is only for university graduates, or university faculty. Discussions have begun, led by the national office, with a goal of rebranding our club. I believe, that as part of this exercise, it is important to consider a new name (to remove the word 'University'), to find a name that better reflects the current reality of women across Canada who are interested in joining. I believe this will ultimately lead to greater inclusion and diversity.

In closing, I have enjoyed serving in my 2 years as president. I have learned a lot and had the opportunity to work with a very engaged and dedicated board. I sincerely thank the board members and the program committee for all of their support. I feel that through our collaborative efforts we have done all we could to fulfil our theme of making our club year 'G.R.E.A.T. I am now looking forward to passing the torch and continuing in a supportive role.

#### **Conversation with Beth Rowles Scott**



Our goal was to create a comfortable and intimate atmosphere for our speaker, Beth Rowles Scott. Surrounded by several beautiful, large photos of people she has worked with in Kenya, along with the conversation style presentation, helped to do just that. Donna VanSant, a member of our club, acted in the role of interviewer and moved the conversation along, making Beth feel as though she was sitting with us in her living room, chatting. As a bonus, we were fortunate to have the use of lapel mics set up by Kevin Fadum, the Executive Director of ACCES, making it easier for us to hear and enjoy, as Beth shared stories from her life's path.

Beth is a gentle and lovely lady, who has achieved much and influenced many lives, both here in Canada and around the world. Through awards presented to her, she has been acknowledged and recognized for her dedication, commitment and work to improve the lives of others. Over her years, Beth has experienced many life challenges and joys. At this time in her life, Beth is 93 years of age, and she is almost blind.

Listening to her soft voice, we could hear passion and joy with contentment and satisfaction. Some of Beth's life's stories have been documented in her first published book— "Pinch Me - A Long Walk from the Prairies". As well, you can read more about her ongoing work as founder of the African Canadian Continuing Education Society – (ACCES)

Beth's opening comment set the scene for us, when she said, "not many people can say, that being in your 70s, 80s and 90s are the best years of their lives...but I can". What an inspirational message for all of us to live by! One of our members wrote to us saying: What an inspirational speaker/program! We learned so much from Beth, especially the 3 things we need for happiness and life satisfaction – *Someone to love, something to do, and something to look forward to*.

Beth attributes happiness and satisfaction in her life to a formula, or a recipe, she has identified those three elements were in place: *Someone to Love, Something to Do and Something to Look Forward To.* Beth surrounded herself with people she loved and valued her relationship with them which brought her joy. Secondly, she learned that there needed to be a sense of accomplishment and satisfaction to make an effective element of happiness. And lastly, she ensured, she had a sense of purpose, adventure and contentment to always look forward to.

We were privileged to have this special time with Beth, as she shared her insights into ways each one of us – no matter what stage in our lives – can handle change, transition and discover both meaningful purpose and learn a way of gauging life satisfaction. Beth gave each



of us a bookmark, so every time we use it, we can think back and relive the experience of sharing time with this remarkable woman. Thank you, Beth.

### In Memoríam



Terry Barry - 1931 - 2022

Terry Barry was a charter member of our club when it was formed in 1959. Terry's story is chronicled in the 2002 book *A History of CFUW in British Columbia*. The article follows here:

Terry Barry - Deep Roots -- Club historian Olive Clark interviews longtime member

Thérèse Barry is the granddaughter of BC pioneers. Her paternal grandfather, Laurent Guichon, came to BC in 1860 from France via the Isthmus of Panama and the California goldfields. Before purchasing 1000 acres of land in the Fraser delta, he operated a pack train from Yale to Quesnel, ranched in the Nicola Valley, and owned a hotel in New Westminster. In 1879, he married compatitot Peronne Rey, who had immigrated to Quesec, later crossing the continent by train and boat to Victoria. Terry's maternal grandparents emigrated from Ireland, settling in Vancouver in the early 1900s. These two pioneer families were joined when Terry's parents married in 1929.



Terry grew up on a farm in Ladner surrounded by aunts and uncles who lived on nearby farms. She attended the local school for ten years, completing her high school as a boarding student at Little Flower Academy in Vancouver. Summers were spent at the family cottage on Tsawwassen beach where siblings and cousins were supervised by maiden aunts. These family connections continue with planned potluck Sunday suppers at the cottage.

Terry graduated with a degree in Commerce and Education from UBC. She taught math and commercial subjects for four years at Vancouver Technical School. While teaching, she me Reg Barry, a fellow teacher and UBC grad. In 1958 they married, moving into Reg's Surrey cottage where they later built their family home. Terry became a full-time

homemaker and began a family, three girls in all. As part of the girls' education, the family began to travel through Canada and the US. Other trips included Britain, France, Switzerland, New Zealand and Australia. All three girls graduated from UBC: Margaret in education, Pat a nurse clinician and marathon runner, and Cathy a nurse, married with five children.



Terry joined CFUW – White Rock as a charter member in 1959. She twice served as Treasurer and continues to be an active member. She plays bridge, and is active in cockery and swing. Terry and Reg, who live in Panorama Ridge, enjoy the company of family and friends, and going for long walks.

Further to the article we learned that Terry was the first woman registered in Commerce at UBC, and that she graduated at the top of the class of 1953.

Terry participated in an early version of the One-to-One Program when members read books into cassettes for school children. She also worked at Bursary Foundation fundraisers such as *Gardens in Bloom*. Her idea to raise our profile in the community by starting the Adopt-A-Street Program was unique! We got the publicity we needed as we worked in our yellow vests. The result was an Adopt-A-Street sign with CFUW on it at Dart's Hill.

Terry played a big role in our 40th Anniversary celebration. She was our committee historian who in pre-computer days wrote many letters to seek out former members to give an update at our banquet. Then, Terry composed a song sung by the Phoenix Chamber Choir. The balance of the program featured 16 skits about humorous incidents that had happened over the 40 years. Terry appeared in four of them!
